Repurposing an Old Building

The Meeting Place

As most of you know the building we currently call the "Meeting Place" was the original Saxton B. Little Library. When the library moved across the street in 1985 the old building served

as a meeting space for town organizations. On September 19, 1989, the Board of Selectmen voted to rename the building "The Meeting Place". The girl scouts, homeschoolers and the Lions Club executive board were the most consistent users, although it was not an ideal meeting space.

In the summer of 2015 the library was returned to the Meeting Place as work went forward on expansion and renovation of the Saxton B. Little Library. The "Mini B" as it was affectionately known stayed in the Meeting Place until October, 2016 when it returned to its newly renovated and expanded facility.

During this time discussions about town space needs and organizational needs ensued. What seemed most pressing was the need for a home for all the Columbia historical materials collected by the Town Historian and the Columbia Historical Society. What better space than the old historical building known as the Meeting Place, so in March 2016 the Board of Selectmen voted to repurpose the building for that use. In order to be more clear as to its purpose, the Board of Selectmen voted on January 17, 2017 to rename the building "The History Place".

Much work has been done on the History Place over the past several months: a refurbished wooden floor, new energy efficient windows, a new climate controlled system to assist in preservation of materials, paint, etc. Each project, orchestrated by our Facilities Manager, Bud Meyers, has been done with the idea of preserving this beautiful building (The History Place) for the future and making it a home for the Town Historian and the Columbia Historical Society and all the artifacts depicting the history of our very special community.
