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### Harvesting Stones, a documentary that tells a timeless story of courage and community

This documentary tells the stories of Jewish farmers who came to eastern Connecticut from the 1890's to the mid 1900s. It tells a tale of how Jewish families were able to escape religious persecution and Holocaust horrors. It follows how these families from Europe were able to establish new lives on farms in Colchester, Lebanon, Moosup, and Plainfield. The film makes a connection between the Jewish farm families, their impact on the towns and cities where they lived and worked, and the lessons and legacies they left behind.

The German-Jewish philanthropist, Baron Maurice de Hirsch created a fund in 1891 that was used to assist Eastern European Jews who were fleeing Russian pogroms, which refers to the outbreak of anti-Jewish violence by non-Jewish street mobs. He wanted to offer Jews an opportunity to learn farming so that they could support themselves and get them out of the teeming tenements of the cities. The Jewish Agricultural Society (JAS), a subsidiary of the Baron de Hirsch fund, was formed in 1900. The JAS acquired land in several states and provided agricultural training for the new farmers. The fund settled about a thousand Jewish farmers in rural Connecticut.
